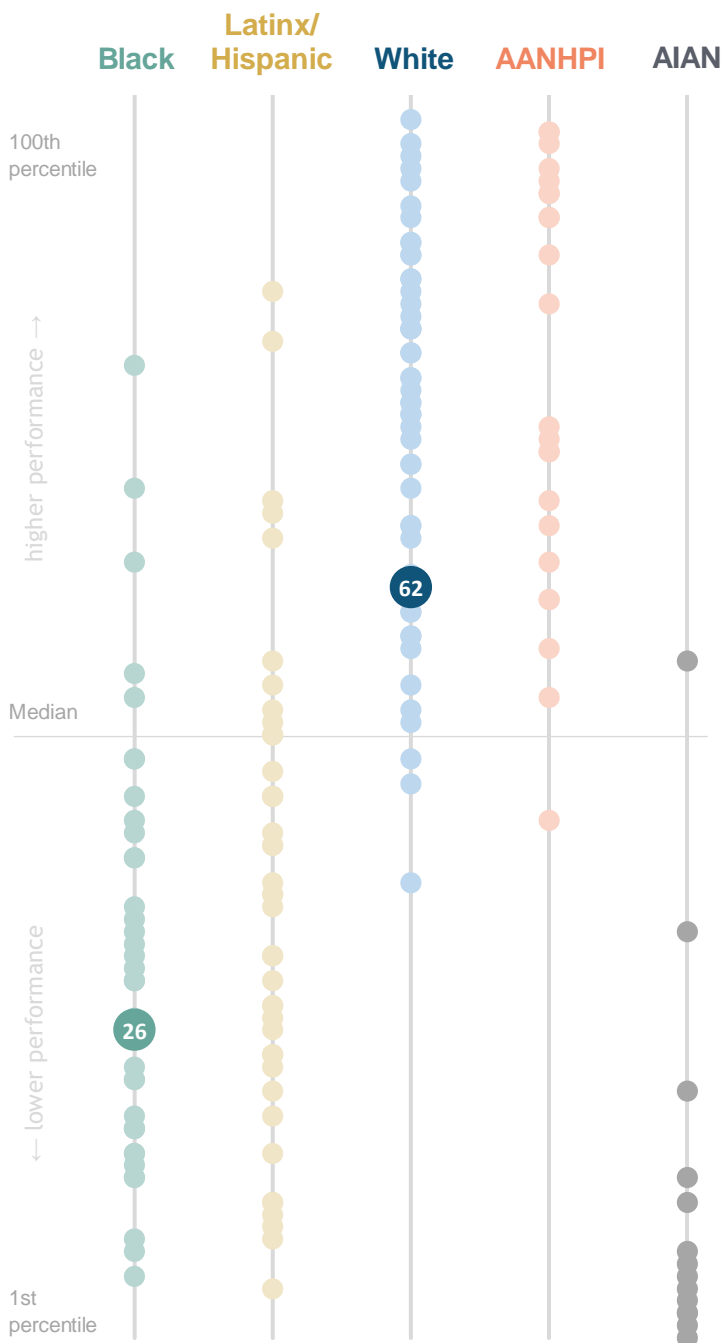


Health Equity in Tennessee
